Carswell said plans for the limousine were discussed with research and engineering officials in the Defense Department and with the President's Office of Science and Technology.

Since existence of a new Presidential limousine could scarcely be kept secret, it was believed that funds for more secret projects dealing with it and other programs were hidden in the appropriations bill.

Mr. Johnson now uses an armored car provided by the Ford Motor Co. for an annual \$500 maintenance charge. It was developed by the firm following Mr. Kennedy's assassination.

But the Secret Service said another car was needed because the present limousine cannot be moved on the Presidential plane when, for example, Mr. Johnson visits two cities in one day.

The Ford company offered to build the second Presidential car for \$325,000 and the follow-up Secret Service vehicle for \$197,000. However, competitive bids will be sought if Congres sprovides the requested funds.

The President had no part in seeking additional funds for his protection. In fact, Carswell wrote the House subcommittee that Mr. Johnson refused to request money for the new limousine.
