So I deeply sympathize for you both. I know that this has been especially difficult for me, as well as for you Harold because I too have always been so active and I find the mental adjusting probably more difficult right now than even the physical limitations.

Harold, I have enclosed a copy of three pamphlets that I have looked the world over for that I would so much like to have on at least be able to read and make copies of. I found them on the back of Joachim Joesten's book "Oswald, Assassin or Fall Guy". I do not want you to go to any trouble for me for me over this Harold, but if you have or maybe know where I might buy or borrow these, I as you know would be eternally grateful.

I am also very grateful that in your talking with Ted about the Select Comm on Assassinations, he seems now to be coming around to what many of us were afraid of in the beginning, but it took his deep respect for you to finally believe what was the inevitable and certainly you must be able to hold your head up very proud indeed because I have never seen Ted back down from a position once he has taken it, and without question he holds you in the highest esteem.

P.S. Did you enjoy, or better yet, receive the copy I sent you of Lilliams speech before the L.A. County Board of Supervisors? By the way, she has already sent the I'm a patsy tape to the gentlemen you spoke to me about in Oklahoma. I called her and everything is just fine. Come to think of it, I should get one for myself. 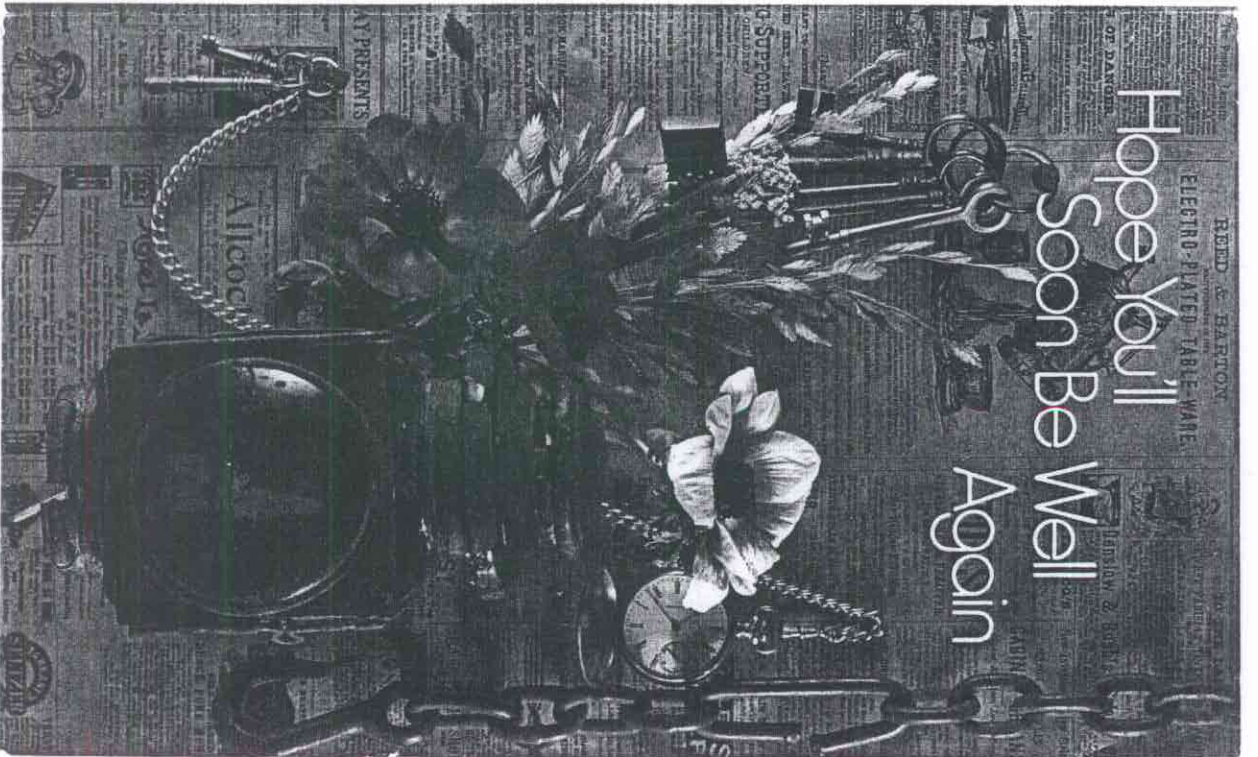
