As requested I am reporting a list of the more important pieces of evidence in the Lee Harvey Oswald case charged with shooting President John F. Kennedy on November 22, 1963 at about 12:35 pm near the underpass.

1. From a search of the Texas School Book Depository building on the 6th floor a 6.5 caliber Carcano carbine rifle # C 2766, mounted with a 0-10 Japanese scope. This rifle was found partially hidden under some boxes near the back stairway.

2. Near a front window at the southeast corner of the building on the same floor were three spent cartridge cases, 6.5 in caliber. These were protected for pictures and prints, and after this was done it was found that the rifle contained one loaded cartridge in the chamber.

3. Lt. Tav of the Crime Lab was able to get a palm print from one of the boxes under this window which proved to be Lee Harvey Oswald's print. A thumb print was also found at this same location.

4. The Crime Lab was able to get a palm print from the underside of the gun barrel near the end of the foregrip, and a partial print was lifted from the trigger housing of the rifle.

5. One large piece of brown wrapping paper fitting the description of one used by Oswald in bringing a large package to work on the morning of the murder. We later found that Puell Wesley Frazier, 2439 W. 5th Street, Irving, Texas had given Oswald a ride to work on the morning of the killing, and both he and his sister, Linnie Mae Pandle, saw Oswald put a long package wrapped in a heavy brown paper in the back seat of the car. After arriving at work, Wesley Frazier saw Oswald take this package and take it with him into the building. This paper was shaped like a crude bag, large enough to carry this rifle. This was also found on the 6th floor.

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6. While we were still searching the building, Mr. Roy L. Irby, 4532 Wade Drive, reported to us that one of his men was missing, a man Harvey Oswald, whose address was 2515 W. 5th Street, Irving, Texas. We also found that this man had been stopped by Officer V. L. Baker while coming down the stairs. Mr. Baker says that he stopped this man on the third or fourth floor in the stairway, but as Mr. Irby identified him as one of the employees, he was released. After seeing that this man was apparently running, two of the detectives and myself left the building and came to the office for an identification check and other information, and soon found that he was the same man who had shot Officer Tippit.

7. A bullet taken from the stretcher used to carry the Governor into the hospital and fragments of a bullet taken from Governor Connally's body were turned over to the F. B. I. who made an examination and, as shown in our report from there, these were fired from this same rifle.

8. One sport shirt that Oswald was wearing at the time of his arrest was sent to the F. B. I. Crime Lab along with a blanket that Mrs. Lee Oswald said the gun had been wrapped in while being kept in the garage at the home of Mrs. Ruth Jaine in Irving. The F. B. I. examination shows that parts of each of these materials could have been the ones that they recovered from the gun.

9. Mrs. Harvey Lee Oswald identified the rifle as resembling the one she had seen in the garage in Irving.

10. During the search of the garage at Mrs. Jaine's home in Irving where Oswald had stored some of his possessions, officers recovered two pictures of Lee Harvey Oswald posing with a gun that looked identical to the gun found and wearing a pistol resembling the pistol used to kill Officer Tippit. We were able to find by checking Oswald's former addresses where this picture was made in a back yard at 211 W. Neesley.

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11. In the same garage officers found two advertisements clipped from some magazine showing this same type gun offered for sale by Kleins of Chicago.

12. In Oswald's purse was found an identification card and a registration card bearing the name of Alex Hidell.

13. Postal Inspectors gave us information that at one time a box had been rented in the name of Alex Hidell. The handwriting on this application was identified as that of Oswald. It was ascertained that the gun was shipped by Kleins of Chicago to this box. Postal Inspectors were also able to find the money order itself used to pay for the gun. This information is not complete in our files, as we are waiting for some information from one of the Postal Inspectors who is ill at this time.

14. In Oswald's billfold was identification identifying him as a member of the Fair Play for Cuba organization. He told us that he was at one time secretary of the New Orleans branch and that the headquarters of this organization was in New York.

15. We found letters showing that Oswald had been corresponding with Arnold Johnson and V. T. Lee. Photostats of these are attached.

16. Oswald had in his possession a notebook containing the names of Russian friends, telephone number and part of General Walker's name, F. B. I. Agent William Hosty's name and license number of his car. This is the agent who had been checking Oswald and his wife.

17. A bus transfer was found in Oswald's pocket and identified by the bus driver who carried Oswald a short distance after the killing.

18. Oswald was positively identified by a cab driver, William Whaley, as the man he picked up near the Greyhound bus station, which is where Oswald left the bus, and took him to the 500 block N. Backley near where Oswald had a room.

19. In searching Oswald's room at 1026 N. Peckley a map of the City of Dallas was found with markings on it, one of which looked to be the scene of the shooting. There was also what looked to be communistic literature.

20. Oswald was carrying, at the time of his arrest in the Texas Theater, a Smith and Wesson .38 caliber revolver, serial # 510210. This is the same caliber gun Officer Tippit was shot with when he stopped Oswald.

21. Two empty .38 cartridge cases were found by Barbara Jeanette Davis and Virginia Davis in front of their home, 400 E. Tenth Street, where they had seen Oswald throw them as he was reloading his gun. Four bullets were recovered from Officer Tippit's body and were of the same caliber as the gun Oswald was arrested with.

22. Helen Markham, 328 E. Ninth Street, saw Oswald shoot Officer Tippit and positively identified him in a lineup. Officer Tippit was shot at 1:18 pm on November 22, 1963 in front of 400 E. Tenth Street. Several other witnesses identified him as the man seen running from the scene and toward the theater. W. W. Scoppins of 3138 Alaska saw Oswald shoot Officer Tippit and identified him in a lineup.

23. We have from forty to fifty affidavits to substantiate all of this evidence.

The complaint was filed on Lee Harvey Oswald for the Tippit murder at 7:05 pm on November 22, 1963. After reviewing the evidence with District Attorney Henry Wade and his assistant, Bill Alexander, and Jim Allen, former prosecutor, I filed a complaint on Oswald for the killing of President John F. Kennedy at 11:26 pm, November 22, 1963.

As you know, this is a hurried list of the evidence and not by any means a complete report. All of this evidence was released almost immediately to the F. B. I. and, of course, has not been available to us for study. We are, however, studying photographs and checking all information that we are able to obtain on these two

ADDITIONAL DETAILS, PROGRESS OF INVESTIGATION, ETC.

In November 24, 1963, at 6:30 A.M., Det. J. R. Leavelle delivered to Captain G. W. Doughty, a lead slug removed from the body of Lee Harvey Oswald at Parkland Hospital by Dr. Joe Stires. The slug was removed in the presence of Burke Aubrey one who placed the letter A on the base of the slug and gave it to Det. Leavelle.

On November 24, 1963, at 7:00 A.M., Captain J. W. Fritz delivered to Capt. G. W. Doughty a Colt Cobra .38 Special revolver # 2744 L1 attached to the gun in an envelope was the following:

- One .38 S&W Special live shell.
- Four .38 Special R&M-UMC live shells.
- One .38 Special R&M-UMC spent hull.

All of the above were released at 11:20 A.M., on December 30, 1963 by Lt. J. C. Day to Det. R. Johnson and Det. L. D. Montgomery, to be taken to the FBI at Austin for examination.

On December 30, 1963 Detectives M. Johnson and L. B. Montgomery of your office, personally submitted to the laboratory the following evidences: one fired lead bullet, one fired Rem-UMC .38 S&W cartridge case, four Rem-UMC .38 Special cartridges, one W.R.W. (Winchester) .38 Special cartridge, and one .38 caliber Colt revolver, serial # 2744 LW, Cobra Model.

It was requested that an examination be made to determine if the bullet was fired from the submitted revolver.

We have completed our examination and wish to report that it is our opinion that the bullet was fired from the submitted revolver.

We will retain the evidence until advised of its disposition.

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STATEMENT OF VICKIE ADAMS

I talked with Vickie Adams at 2:10 pm this date, February 17, 1964. The following statement is what she said happened November 22, 1963.

My name is Vickie Adams, 3000 Cole, Art. D., no phone. My job is office service representative. I reported to work that day about 8:30 am, and I worked in that capacity until noon.

A friend of mine, Elsie Farnon, who lives in Oak Cliff and works in the office, wanted to take some moving pictures of the motorcade. I opened a third floor window about the third one from the front of the building. She took pictures of the motorcade. When the President got in front of us I heard someone call him, and he turned. That is when I heard the first shot. I thought it was a fire cracker. Then the second shot I saw the Secret Service man run to the back of the President's car. After the third shot, I went out the back door. I said, "I think someone has been shot." The elevator was not running and there was no one on the stairs. I went down to the first floor. I saw Mr. Kelly and another employee named Bill. The freight elevator had not moved, and I still did not see anyone on the stairs.

I ran out the back door of the depository and around to the front. I started down toward the railroad tracks when an officer stopped me and turned me back. I asked the officer if the President was shot, and he said he did not know. As I turned back I saw another employee Moena standing by the front of the building facing Elm Street. I stopped and talked with Avery Davis another employee. I saw two men in street clothes, one was gesturing

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with his hands and asking questions. I asked Mr. Davis who he was. I later saw Jack Ruby on TV and thought it was the same man. No one had surrounded the building at that time. I went back into the building and to the passenger elevator, but the power was off. I went to the back to the freight elevator. There was two plainclothes men on it. However, the power on it also was turned off. I walked up the stairs to the fourth floor to my office. We were later told to leave.

This concludes Miss. Adams' statement to me.

SUBJECT stated that he and THOMAS FORD were at Elm and Houston Streets watching the parade at the time President KENNEDY was shot. SUBJECT stated that immediately after the shooting he went into the Texas School Book Depository and called Radio Station WFAA. SUBJECT further stated that he did not know LEE HARVEY OSWALD at that time and that he does not remember seeing him in or around the Depository. SUBJECT also stated that he does not remember seeing MARINA OSWALD OR JACK BERRY in the vicinity. He also stated that he did not know either of these persons at that time.

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INTERVIEW WITH MISS DOBIE BURNS

Miss Burns has worked for the Macmillan Company for about nine years. Her office is in the center of the Texas School Book Depository Building on the third floor. Miss Burns had the radio on and heard the motorcade was close to her location. She walked to Mr. Wilson's office on the third floor facing Elm Street. The window was open and she heard the last shot before she got to the window. Mr. Wilson said someone had been shot. She said she hoped no one had been hurt. She came back to her office. In a little while officers came by and talked to her. She states she had ridden the freight elevator one time with Oswald, did not know who he was at that time. She did not see Oswald on the 22 of November 1963. She came to work at 8:00 am that day. She left about 2:00 pm after being checked out of the building. She has seen Oswald one time on TV and has never seen Ruby. Does not know him. Miss Burns lives at 2617 Shelby and her phone number is FA 8 1976.

STATEMENT OF MR. G. V. CAMPBELL

I talked with Mr. Campbell this date, February 17, 1964, at 6:00 pm.
The following is a statement he gave me.

My name is G. V. Campbell, 7120 Twin Tree Lane, DAI 5527. I am the
Vice-president of the Texas School Book Depository, 411 Elm Street.

On November 22, 1963, I arrived at work between 8:30 and 9:00 am. My
office is on the second floor, Room 200. I did my usual work until noon.
I had forgotten about the parade. I started to lunch with Mr. Truly. When
we got downstairs Mr. Truly asked if I wanted to wait and see the parade. We
waited on the front steps until the parade turned off Main Street on to Houston
Street. We then walked across Elm Street and stood on the curb near the
parade as it turned from Houston Street down under the underpass. I heard
the shots, it sounded like they came from the knoll near the railroad tracks.
I thought it was fire crackers. A uniform officer came up and at the same
time a construction worker with a helmet on came across the street and said
he had seen a rifle barrel in the sixth floor window. I walked back in the
building. Mr. Truly and the officer had already come in and up the stairs.
I waited until they came back down to see if they found anything. The em-
ployees were standing around. When Mr. Truly came down he said one of the
employees was missing, a man named Oswald. I did not know Oswald. I told
Mr. Truly to tell the officers about him and what he looked like.

I went back to my office and an FBI agent came in and introduced himself.
I don't remember his name. He asked that I have all the employees vacate
the building. This I did, telling them to take the rest of the day off.

I remained in the office until about 2:30 or 3:00 pm. Then I left.
The officers were still searching the building when I left.

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INTERVIEW WITH MRS. AVERY DAVIS

Mrs. Davis lives at 902 Westmount. She is an employee at the Texas School Book Depository Building. She has worked for the Scott Foresman Co. for about five months. This is on the fourth floor of the Texas School Book Depository Building.

Mrs. Davis stated she came to work at 8:30 am on November 22, 1963. She stayed in her office on the fourth floor until about 12:00 noon or a little later. She went to the Elm Street entrance and watched the parade from the steps. She saw the motorcade pass her location. From her location she heard the three shots and thought they came from the railroad to the west. She was with Judy McCully. She then went back to work on the fourth floor. Mrs. Davis stated in a little while several officers came by and talked to her. She has never seen Oswald in the building. She works for a separate company and they use a separate company elevator and she does not come in contact with employees of the Texas School Book Depository. She does not know Jack Ruby. Mrs. Davis did look out the window of the fourth floor after she went back to work. She saw a group of officers on the sidewalk talking to some people. She states there was a man about the size of Ruby with them, but she was looking straight down and didn't see his face, so she thinks it was probably an officer.

Pursuant to the instructions of Captain W.P. Gannaway an investigation was conducted with the following results.

SUBJECT, who resides at 7727 BEARDEN LANE, telephone number EV-1-6825, was interviewed by the undersigned officers this date. SUBJECT has been employed by the MAC MILLAN PUBLISHING COMPANY for three and one half years. MAC MILLAN PUBLISHING COMPANY is located in Suite 302 in the TEXAS SCHOOLBOOK DEPOSITORY BUILDING, 411 ELM. SUBJECT stated she was standing on the front steps of the building when President J.F. Kennedy was assassinated. SUBJECT further stated that she did not personally know LEE HARVEY OSWALD, but ascertained that she had seen him, since she had gone to the first floor of the building, where the TEXAS SCHOOLBOOK DEPOSITORY is located, several times because MAC MILLAN used their shipping department. SUBJECT also stated that she only casually knew JOE RODRIGUEZ MOLINA, but thought his name was MARINO. SUBJECT further stated that she did not know JACK RUBY, and had never seen RUBY around the building or seen him talking to OSWALD.

SUBJECT resides at 303 N. Forest Crest, Garland, Texas with
his wife, MARY MARGARET. He has been employed with WFAA-AM-FM-TV
COMMUNICATION CENTER since July 3, 1963, and is presently working
in the PROMOTION DEPT. of this company. His office telephone
number is RI2-9631, and his residence, BR6-2617.

SUBJECT stated that on November 22, 1963, he and PIERCE M.
ALLMAN, also with WFAA, were standing near the corner of Elm and
Houston watching President JOHN F. KENNEDY'S motorcade. Suddenly,
three shots rang out and he and ALLMAN started running. A few
moments later they ran into the TEXAS SCHOOL BOOK DEPOSITORY BUILDING
where ALLMAN used a telephone to call his radio station. SUBJECT
stated that he was not acquainted with LEE HARVEY OSWALD or JACK RUBY,
nor did he remember seeing either of them on the day of the assassination.
He also said that as he was leaving the aforementioned building, someone
took his name and address, but he does not know who this person was.

Sirs:

On the morning of February 17, 1964 this office was notified that the SUBJECT had contacted the Albuquerque office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation on Saturday, February 15, 1964 and had told the agents in that office that he was enroute to Dallas to testify in the JACK RUBY trial. The SUBJECT was asked if he had a subpoena as a witness and he stated 'No, but that he was going to be there any how and testify.'

This SUBJECT had previously contacted the Federal Bureau of Investigation Agents in Portland, Oregon and had told the agents that he had dreamed that Lee HARVEY OSWALD was going to kill the President in the month of November, 1963. The SUBJECT stated that this dream had occurred in July of 1963.

The Dallas F B I Agents stated that the SUBJECT was probably enroute to Dallas and that he was driving a 1960 Oldsmobile sedan, 2 door, color beige, bearing Oregon 1963 license 24-7877.

At approximately 11:00 am 2-17-64, the SUBJECT was arrested at the Dallas County District Attorney's Office and had a pistol in his possession. This arrest was effected by a Dallas Police Officer and a Dallas County Deputy Sheriff. SUBJECT also had in his possession a rubber stamp for making cards imprinted 'HALLI STAMP OUT KIKES THE NEGROID BRITICS WANT TO IMPROVE THE IR NEGRO COUSINS --- REACTIONARY NO. 1.' A copy of this stamp is attached to each copy of this report.

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L. HOLLIES, WIFE OF J. HOLLIES, W/F

This interview with Miss Hollies took place February 18, 1964, at 12:15 PM. Miss Hollies lives at 220 West Davis, Dallas, Texas, but has no telephone. She is employed by the Postmaster, 4th Floor, Texas School Book Depository. On November 22, 1963, Miss Hollies was on the fourth floor of the Texas School Book Depository Building, and was standing with Alice Foster looking out a window, watching the presidential parade. At about 12:35 PM, Miss Hollies heard three shots, just as the President's car was headed down toward the triple underpass. She stated the shots sounded as if they were coming from inside the building. Miss Hollies stated that she never left the building. The police came and talked to her shortly afterward. Miss Hollies states she did not know the shooter, but had seen him in the lunchroom of the Texas School Book Depository on several occasions. She does not know Jack Ruby.

The following report is submitted for your information.

Assistant District Attorney BILL ALEXANDER contacted this office by telephone this date, requesting information on one ANITA who operated ANITA'S PLACE at Lancaster Rd. and Kahn St. in 1955. ALEXANDER had information that JACK RUBY and LEE HARVEY OSWALD were both going to this location in 1955 and knew each other.

The City Directory for the year 1955 was checked and revealed that SUBJECT operated this tavern at that time. The correct address as listed by the 1955 City Directory was 6222 S. Lancaster.

A check of the Vice Section files reveal that SUBJECT operated this place, listing her husband as MARION E. HUDGINS, who was shown by the City Directory for 1955 as being an employee of the Murray Co. Vice files also revealed SUBJECT used the name of ALLIE MAE HOLKCOMB HUDGINS, d.o.b. 13 May, 1903, and listed SUBJECT'S husband and her address as 1506 Garza St.

The City Directory of the year 1963 reveals that SUBJECT, under the given name of ALLIE, and her husband MARION E. HUDGINS are still residing at 1506 Garza.

SUBJECT resides at 2901 Northwest Highway with her father and mother. She has been employed as a secretary by the Kelly Girl Service since October, 1963.

SUBJECT was assigned to work at the Texas School Book Depository for five days during November, 1963 and was there on November 22, 1963.

SUBJECT stated that she was on the third floor of the Texas School Book Depository standing at the north window at the time President KENNEDY was shot. She stated that she heard the noise but did not realize that it was shooting until she was told.

SUBJECT also stated that she has been to the Vegas Club and knows EVA GRANT but that she cannot remember ever seeing JACK RUBY. She further stated that she did not know LEE HARVEY OSWALD or MARINA OSWALD, that she cannot recall ever seeing any of these people around the Depository or any other place.

SUBJECT was interviewed by the undersigned Officers and stated that she has been working for the MACHILLAN PRINTING COMPANY on the 3rd floor of the SCHOOL BOOK DEPOSITORY at 411 Elm Street for 2 years and 1 month. SUBJECT also stated that she was standing on the front row of persons on Elm Street at the time of the assassination.

SUBJECT stated that she did not know LEE HARVEY OSWALD but could have seen him several times in the employees lounge of the Depository that is located on the 2nd floor of the building.

SUBJECT stated that she did not see OSWALD on the day of the assassination and that she knew of no associates of OSWALD. SUBJECT also stated that she knew JOE MORRISON MALINA only casually and had seen him several times in the hallways and on the elevator in the Depository.

SUBJECT stated that she knew JACK RUBY on sight as she frequented the VEGAS CLUB on her off hours. SUBJECT further stated that she was casually acquainted with EVA GRANT, RUBY'S sister who operated the VEGAS CLUB and had spoken to her on several occasions. SUBJECT also stated that she had never seen RUBY around the BANK DEPOSITORY or in company of OSWALD.

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INTERVIEW WITH JOE F. MOLINA

This interview with Mr. Molina took place November 23, 1963. Mr. Molina was born in Dallas on June 18, 1924. He lives at 4306 Brown, telephone WA6-3956. He has worked for the Texas School Book Depository for sixteen years. He has been Credit Manager for three or four years. Before this three or four years, he was an accountant in the Credit Department. His family consists of his wife Soledad, and four children: a son, Joe, Jr., age 16; a daughter Linda, age 13; a daughter Sylvia, age 13; and an adopted boy Johnny, age 10.

Mr. Molina saw Oswald at work and knew him but never talked to him and didn't know him personally. Mr. Molina belongs to the T. I. Forum, was chairman of that group. This was a group organized primarily for the education and betterment of Spanish speaking veterans.

On November 22, 1963 Mr. Molina got to work about 7:00 am. He went to his office on the Second floor. He stayed there until about 11:45 am. He did not see Oswald. He ate his lunch in the coffee room on the third floor and then went outside and stood on the first step of the Commerce Street entrance. This was about 12:15 pm. He states that he heard three shots; he did not know where they came from. Mr. Molina then went down the embankment toward Commerce Street, saw officers closing the gate to the parking lot to the west of the School Book Depository building. Mr. Truly then went back into the building and stayed on the first floor. He still did not see Oswald. Mr. Molina states he was on the steps with Mr. Shelly, Mrs. Stanton, Mr. Reed, Mr. Sanders and Eddie Piper. Molina then went to Sanders on Main Street to have his wife pick him up,

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as she couldn't get into the area of the School Book Depository. Mr. Molina stated that at 10:00 a.m. he met Eddie Piper again, and Piper told him that Oswald had not been accounted for at the depository.

Mr. Molina stated he did not belong to any other organizations.

There was an FBI agent present at this interview. The agent's name is believed to be Hosty. This report written February 18, 1964 from notes taken November 23, 1963. INTERVIEW WITH JUDY MC CULLY, W/F

This interview with Miss Judy Mc Cully took place February 18, 1964, at 11:30 AM at her place of employment—Scott-Foreman Company, 4th Floor, Texas School Book Depository. Miss Mc Cully lives at 4144 Emerson, Dallas, Texas, telephone LA 8-0098.

Miss Mc Cully stated that on November 22, 1963, she and Mrs. Avery Davis were standing on the front steps of the Texas School Book Depository at 12:30 PM, and were watching the Presidential parade. She saw the President's car go by, and as the car proceeded down toward the triple underpass, she heard three shots. The shots sounded like they came from the right side of the building in the arcade. She stated that she started running to see what was happening, and saw the President's car speed off. She heard a woman scream, and then she went back into the building. She then started to leave the building again and was stopped by the police who had entered the building after the shooting. Miss Mc Cully stated she knew Oswald by sight, and had seen him in the building on different occasions, but did not recall seeing him on November 22, 1963. Miss Mc Cully states that she did not know Jack Ruby. Miss Mc Cully stated she left the building at 2:00 or 2:30, November 22, 1963, and went home.

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INTERVIEW WITH DITH NELSON

Mrs. Nelson is a part-time employee of the Scott-Bresman Co. She has been with them since 1953. She lives at 6115 Goliad, Dallas, Texas. On November 22, 1963 she came to work at 8:30 am. She stayed on the fourth floor of the Texas School Book Depository Building until the parade came by. Then she went to the fourth window from the east side of the building facing Elm Street. The window was closed. She stood up and watched the motorcade. She heard the three loud reports and thought they were part of the celebration. She saw the police and cameramen run to the west. She went to the west side of the building, didn't see anyone and went back to work. Later, the police talked to her and checked her out of the building at about 2:00 or 2:30 pm. She never saw Oswald or Jack Ruby at the building. She uses the front elevator, Elm Street side, and doesn't come in contact with the actual School Book Depository employees.

Pursuant to the instructions of Captain W. J. Gannaway, subj at was interviewed this date, regarding his knowledge of the activities of Oswald and the assassination of President John F. Kennedy.

Subject gave the following information: "I have been working here at the Texas School Book Depository for five years as a porter. I come to work at 10:00 A. M. and get off at 5:00 P. M. on the day Kennedy was shot I came to work at my usual time and saw Oswald who comes to work at 8:00 A. M. going about his usual routine as an order filler. I noticed nothing unusual about Oswald's actions. At 12:00 noon, I told Oswald that I was going to eat my sandwich. Oswald replied something that he was going up to eat. This was the last time I saw Oswald."

"During the Presidential parade, I was standing by a window on the lower floor at the front of the building watching the cars pass when I heard this shot. It shook the window and I moved away from the window and looked at the clock. It was exactly 11:57 A. M. There were shots were fired. I distinctly heard three shots in all. One shot said they were coming from the railroad tracks, I said no they are coming from the top of the building."

"I did not see Oswald leave the building. Oswald was very quiet and had nothing to say much to the other employees. During the lunch breaks, Oswald usually made several phone calls, which were usually short in length."

"I have never seen Jack Ruby before watching him on television when he shot Oswald."

That she did not know Lee Harvey Oswald and that as far as she knew, she had never seen him. She stated that she had heard that Oswald had been at the building for approximately six weeks.

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INTERVIEW WITH OTIS WILLIAMS

This interview with Mr. Otis Williams took place February 18, 1964, at 12:45 PM. Mr. Williams is employed by the Texas School Book Depository and lives at 3429 Southwestern Boulevard, Dallas, Texas, Telephone LM 3-3100.

On November 22, 1963, at around 12:30 PM, Mr. Williams was standing on the front steps of the Texas School Book Depository watching the President's parade. He heard three shots that sounded like they were coming from the west side of the Texas School Book Depository. The president's car had gotten out of Mr. Williams's view when he heard the shots. Mr. Williams then came back into the building, and went to his office on the second floor. He then went to the fourth floor after hearing that the President had been shot. He used the stairway to go to the fourth floor, but stated that he did not see anyone on the stairway. Mr. Williams stated that he did not recall seeing Lee Oswald on the day of the shooting. Mr. Williams stated that he talked to the police shortly after the shooting. Mr. Williams signed out of the building at 3:00, or 3:30 PM, November 22, 1963.

INTERVIEW WITH MRS. H. G. WHITAKER

Mrs. Whitaker is an employee of the Macmillan Book Co. and works on the third floor of the Texas School Book Depository Building. She lives at 1035 Glen Park Drive, Dallas, F.D. 4386. She came to work on November 22, 1963 at about 9:30 am. The Macmillan Company is in the center of the building, has no outside windows. Mrs. Whitaker left the office about 11:00 am. She ate lunch in the Macmillan office and then walked to Samper on Elm Street and got back to the store of the building on the Elm Street side. This was the Texas School Book Depository Building. This was about 12:30 pm. She saw the motorcade pass and then heard two shots. She saw a lot of people run toward the train tracks west of the building. She ran toward the west also, then stopped and went in the entrance, Elm Street side, and officers would not let her go up to her office or leave the building. Mr. Jones, her boss, came by and they were allowed to return to their office. They left about 2:00 or 2:30 pm. They were escorted to the first floor by officers after they had given their names and addresses. She did not remember ever having seen Oswald. She did not see or know Ruby. She stated the shots sounded like they came from the west of the building, but they did sound as if they came from above.

INFORMATION REGARDING ARNOLD LOUIE ROWLAND W/M/19

After the assassination of the President, Rowland was interviewed as a witness. At this time he listed his address as 3026 Hammerly Drive. On this date, February 10, 1964, an effort was made to locate this subject, and it was found that 3026 Hammerly Drive is the address of this subject's mother-in-law. He states that she has not seen the subject or her daughter since January 1964.

A check with Dawson High School shows that this subject listed his address as 800 S. Marsalis. This is a fictitious address. In further conversation with the subject's in-laws, they told us that the only contact they had with him was through letters and they addressed their letters to this subject at Post Office Box 1967, Dallas, Texas.

A check with Mr. Armstrong of the Postal Inspector's Office shows that the box 1967 was rented on November 21, 1963 by this subject who gave his address as 1111 Lakehurst Court. A check was made of this address and it was found that this subject lived at this address from September 11, 1963 until November 11, 1963. He moved and left no forwarding address.

He moved from 1111 Lakehurst Court a week before he rented the Post Office Box 1967.
