

City of Dallas releases all JFK files

DALLAS (AP) — The City Council on Monday unanimously ordered the police department to release all its remaining files on President Kennedy's assassination.

The files include some documents found recently in police intelligence archives and other city held materials.

"Maybe they (files) will reveal something, maybe they won't," said council member Domingo Garcia, who submitted the resolution.

The resolution also urges Congress to release all federal files sealed from public view. They are sealed until the year 2029.

Most of the city's records had already been made public, but some were discovered only recently by the Police Department. Those records will now be added to the municipal archives.

Police have also asked all department employees and retirees to turn over any assassination-related records they may have.

Kennedy was fatally shot during a motorcade in downtown Dallas on Nov. 22, 1963. The Warren Commission concluded that Kennedy was

shot by Lee Harvey Oswald, who acted alone.

Theories of a larger conspiracy to assassinate Kennedy have persisted, however. The issue has come to the fore again with the release of Oliver Stone's movie "JFK," which centers on one such alleged conspiracy.
