My disagreement with your theory is rather total. Id content, as you ask. That improved it because of his handling. An odessey for the middle class, heralded as a great victory. The off-year elections, his performance was very good, much better than expected or than average. But if Dealey did have such an idea, the timing was way off that long before the election. That time would never have been necessary to it. Too much could happen in the interval, including discovery.

...I know of no reason to believe Bobby or any of his men responsible for bringing him down. But if they had such a scheme, they'd never have picked a man who was such a hopelessly bad marksman as the shooter, for it would have come out that he was incapable of the feat. ...Did Bobby override Hollings or State? I think State. You can be sure "Frances" might well be privy to such a plot.

I believe that of all the places LBJ could have been, the most likely is somewhere near the front door. He certainly was not on the 6th floor, and all the evidence is he didn't bring his rifle in. I do not think anyone would have figured they could get acceptance of firecrackers as an attempt on JFK's life, least of all Oswald, who was no dove, and he'd have had all that time to think it over and decide whether or not there was a real attempt, it was still for him.
