Senate Unit To Examine Press Rights

The Senate Constitutional Rights Subcommittee an-nounced plans yesterday for hearings on the relationship between the government and Rights the press.

The hearings will begin Sept 28 and continue for several weeks, according to Sen, Sam J. Ervin Jr. (D-N.C.).

"The subcommittee's study and hearings are prompted in part by recent developments which have caused many Americans to question the vitality and significance of the Constitution's free-press guar-antee," he said in a statement.

"The increased subpoening of journalists by grand juries and congressional committees, efforts to secure injunctions against certain newspaper publications, the use of assumed press credentials for investigative 'covers,' and new fears about government con-trol and regulation of the broadcast media have brought into sharp relief existing con-cern about the relationship be-

tween government and the press," Ervin said.

He said the subcommittee intends "to define more clearly the problems which the 'free press' in America faces today." The subcommit-tee will question newsmen and

sovernment officials.
