

Officers involved in Panther raid

Here is a list of the 14 state's attorney's policemen who staged a predawn raid Dec. 4 on an apartment in which Black Panthers Fred Hampton and Mark Clark were killed.

The men, members of the Chicago Police Department detached to special duty with the state's attorney's office, have earned a total of 12 department commendations and 63 honorable mentions. Five of the policemen involved in the Panther raid are black.

The information was obtained from Chicago Police Department personnel files.

12 years on force

Leading the raid was Sgt. Daniel Groth, 40. Groth joined the police department on Oct. 1, 1957. He received two honorable mentions, and was assigned to the Monroe Street District before joining state's attorney's police.

With Groth on the raid were:

Raymond D. Broderick, 50, who joined the police department on Oct. 8, 1951.

Edward Carmody, 41, who joined the police department on Sept. 22, 1953, and has served in the Area 2 youth division. He received a commendation and 12 honorable mentions.

John Ciczewski, 33, who joined the department on July 11, 1966. He served in the Area 4 task force and received one honorable mention.

William T. Corbett, 39, who joined on Nov. 16, 1965. He served as a detective with Area 2 homicide and received four honorable mentions.

James Davis, 46, a policeman for 21 years. He served in the Marquette District and received one commendation and eight honorable mentions.

Joseph F. Gorman, 34, who

joined on July 1, 1957. He received four commendations and two honorable mentions.

Lynwood Harris, 39, who joined on Nov. 16, 1955. He served in the human relations section and received one commendation.

Joined in 1953

Fred Howard, 48, who joined on April 9, 1953. He received one department honorable mention.

Robert Hughes, 42, who joined on Sept. 21, 1953. He received two commendations and two honorable mentions.

George Jones, 25, who joined on Dec. 19, 1966, served in the Monroe Street District and received 13 honorable mentions.

Philip Joseph, 27, who joined on Dec. 19, 1966. He served in the Grand Crossing District and received two honorable mentions.

William T. Kelly, 39, who joined on Nov. 15, 1955. He received two honorable mentions.

John Marusch, 47, who joined on April 14, 1952. He served in the Englewood district and received three commendations and 14 honorable mentions.

The black policemen on the Panther raid were Davis, Jones, Joseph, Howard and Harris.
