He currently operates a poultry business in Maryland and is the author of "Whitewash" which was highly critical of the Warren Commission report concerning the assassination of President Kennedy. He also has been critical of the Bureau.

Between December 21, 1967 and January 10, 1972, Edgar Eugene Bradley has contacted the Los Angeles Office of the FBI on several occasions to provide information regarding the assassination of President John F. Kennedy in Dallas, Texas, on November 22, 1963.

Bradley, age 50, 12208 Emelita Street, North Hollywood, California, in December 1967, was charged with conspiracy in the assassination of President Kennedy by District Attorney James Garrison, New Orleans, Louisiana, and since then has conducted his own inquiry concerning allegations against him. In November 1968, Bradley successfully avoided extradition to New Orleans, Louisiana, to face the conspiracy charge.

Bradley, according to an article appearing in the "Valley Times", North Hollywood, California, on December 21, 1967, was reported to be a representative of 20th Century Reformation Hour Broadcast, a world wide christian reformation movement headquartered in Collingswood, New Jersey, and headed by Dr. Carl McIntire who has been accused by critics of being strongly right wing in his political beliefs.

On January 8, 1971, Bradley furnished the Los
Angeles Office of the FBI information from an undisclosed
source that Harold Weisberg, who resides near Baltimore,
Maryland, has been closely associated with District Attorney
James Garrison, and is writing a book blaming the FBI
for the assassination of President Kennedy. According to
Bradley, Weisberg told Bradley's source that he is
receiving the information concerning the FBI from a high
official in the United States Secret Service (USSS). Bradley's
source did not know the identity of this official in the USSS.

Bradley said he did not know if there was any truth to the allegations concerning Weisberg. As to Weisberg's background, Bradley advised the Congressional Record of September 29, 1968, contains a speech by Congressman weisberg as having been removed.
