

Kelley Addresses Crime Conference

GENEVA, Switzerland, Sept. 2 (AP)—FBI Director Clarence M. Kelley told the United Nations Crime Prevention Congress today that greater cooperation from individual citizens was needed to "turn the tide against crime."

"An increased sense of personal responsibility and conduct must be generated if we are to overcome crime," Kelley declared at a meeting discussing police-community relations.

Kelley Calls for Citizens To Help Fight on Crime

NORFOLK, Va., Aug. 18 (UPI)—Americans are losing the fight against crime but increased citizen involvement could turn the tide, Clarence M. Kelley, Director of Federal Bureau of Investigation, said today.

Mr. Kelley, in a speech before the Norfolk Chamber of Commerce, said there was an 18 per cent jump in serious crimes for the first quarter of this year, and Americans appeared to be too tolerant of crime to do their part by helping out law enforcement officials.

"Unfortunately, many Americans have abdicated this responsibility," he said. "This tendency to abdicate personal responsibility has clearly contributed to the crime problem we face today."
