

No conspiracy seen in slaying of JFK

BOSTON (UPI) — FBI Director Clarence Kelly says there was no conspiracy involved in the assassination of President John F. Kennedy, according to the Boston Sunday Herald Advertiser.

"I think it's solved now. And I don't know of any connection with any conspiracy," Kelly said in an interview with the Hearst Newspapers. "We're not discarding that as a possibility. We will explore it."

"But we feel we have determined who assassinated the President and we feel that this will be borne out by the review of our investigation."

The Senate Intelligence Committee was expected to issue a report this week on the Kennedy assassination.

Written by Sens. Richard Schweiker, R-Pa., and Gary Hart, D-Colo., the report was expected to recommend reopening the Warren Commission investigation.

Kelly, who joined the FBI a decade after Kennedy was shot in Dallas, said he

personally reviewed files and talked to investigators.

He said he was sure the agency did not withhold evidence connecting Kennedy's death to CIA attempts to kill Cuban Premier Fidel Castro.

Kelly said the FBI investigation of the shooting was "a good investigation ... we did develop the information as fully as we could. I know of nothing to indicate that we were remiss."
