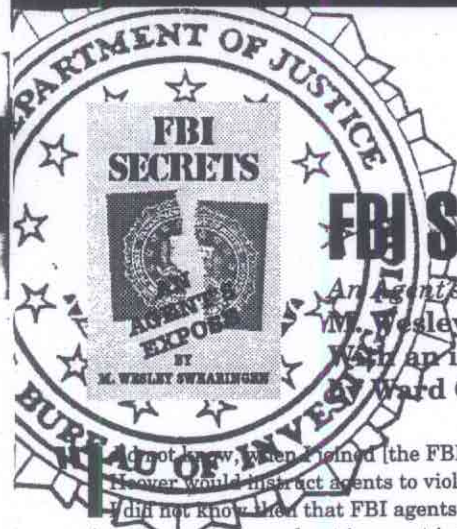

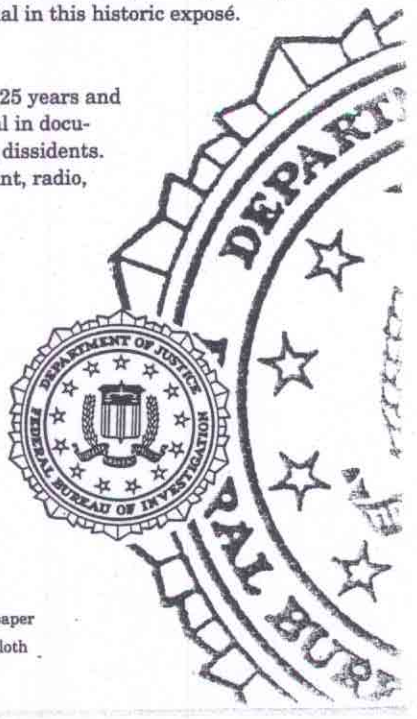
Spy, spook, gum-shoe: Wesley Swearingen was a patriotic college grad when he became an Agent in J. Edgar Hoover's private army: the FBI. Twenty-five years later he had seen his fill of political harassment, lying to Congress, and paying off assassins; he was ready to blow the whistle on America's political police. His is the first insider's account of the FBI's COINTELPRO era.

From the '50s to the '70s in Chicago, New York and Los Angeles, Swearingen records his participation in campaigns against Communists and Moslems, Weathermen, Black Panthers, and United Slaves. The gradual transformation of Swearingen — from dreaming of fighting the Mob to feeling compelled to condemn the institution he once revered — is a metaphor for Americans' growing lack of faith in their government. Readers interested in domestic repression or U.S. history more generally will find invaluable primary source material in this historic exposé.
