forget the many instances in the past when this flag has flown in the cause of liberty at Anzio, Normandy and Iwo Jima, to name but a few familiar battles — in which many Americans now living have participated."

Garrison said the flag represents, among other things, the right of dissent against government and "it is all the more ironic that it should have been hauled down in connection with the exercise of that right,"

The DA said state law prohibits desecration of the flag and/"this office is not free to disregard the law."

ON THE OTHER hand, he said, there has been no "scatter-gun charging of everyone in sight." He observed that the demonstration essentially was peaceful and did not escalate into vandalism and violence.

There is no intent to limit free speech i but dissent must be accomplished with out violence or desecration of the flag; at this point, the rights of others are interferred with U. Garrison said.

THE DA'S chief aide, Charles Ray Ward, was on the scene when the 27 persons were arrested. Police Supt. Joseph I. Giarrusso also was present.

The penalty for conviction of flag desecration is not more than a \$100 fine, or 90 days in jail, or both.
