DA Says Stories

NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 19 (AP). - District Attorney Jim Garrison said Sunday "irres-sponsible" publicity may slow hts Kennedy assassination probe and could endanger lives.

Garrison, however, reaffirmed his statement that arrests will be made and that he thinks convictions will result. He rejected a suggestion from Rep. Gerald R. Ford (R., Mich.) that he give his information to the United States Attorney General, who could pass it on to President Johnson.

PROBING CONSPIRACY

"I am running this investigation, not the President, not the Attorney General," said Garri

"We are investigating a con-piracy which appeared to have courred in New Orleans and hey don't bave a thing in the world to do with it. Now, if they want to help me, I'll welcome their help. But I'm not report-ing to anybody." Garrison said involvement "We are investigating a con-

Garrison said involvement with Federal officers would slow his investigation. He said he is out to prove that a conspiracy conceived here "culminated in the assassination of "President John F. Kennedy in Dallas Nov. 22, 1963.**

OTHERS INVOLVED

There is no question, he said, that others besides Lee Harvey Oswald, a former New Orleans resident, were involved in the

Conspiracy.

This goes counter to the Warren Commission, which said its exhaustive investigation showed that Oswald shot the President and that there was no credible evidence that anyone else was implicated.

Garrison said he was making substantial progress before a New Orleans newspaper publish-ed a story on the investigation.
