CIA Denies Role In Beret Case

The Central Intelligence gency yesterday denied it ad made any recommendaions to the Green Berets bout how to deal with the Vitnamese national who was hurdered.

Rep. Peter W. Rodino (D-N.J.) reported this as the CIA's position after John Marry, representative of the agency, met with the congressmen in his office here.

There have been widespread reports that the CIA was deeply involved in the murder case. Yesterday's assertion was the closest thing yet to an official agency denial of involvement.

The CIA, according to Rodino, also denied it had recommended any disciplinary ac-tion be taken against the Green Berets in connection with the killing.
