I've just finished the Harrison Livingstone book coauthored with Robert Groden, by which I mean that I'm sure just about 100% of the writing was Harry's, and in many ways it is a very bad book. I won't go into that now except to tell you that if you get and use it the index and the bibliography are quite incomplete and that you ought check the footnotes, which generally are to the least substantial sources. He draws most heavily on Penn Jones, Gary Shaw, James Hepburn (Farewell America) and the book he cites as ~~FEINSTEIN WOULD NOT ACTUALLY WRITE~~ ~~BY~~ ~~MIKE~~ ~~EWING~~. ~~BY~~ ~~MIKE~~ ~~EWING~~.

It is titled appropriately, "High Season," and he argues the case for the title at the end, including with Fletcher Prouty's afterword.

Among the sources quoted is one that, if you or Jerry have not read it, I am sure you will want to get and read. It is General Thomas Lane's "The Leadership of President Kennedy," with a foreword by General Ben Moreell. From the quotations they argue that there ought not be and under the Constitution there is not political control over the military and the JFK seized this control in violation of the ~~Constitution~~.

From the quotations of that work I got the ^{my} impression it is virtually a call for a coup d'etat.

I do not remember hearing of this book before and I don't know if Harry has a personal copy. However, because he lives in Baltimore, I presume that if he didn't he may have had access in one of Baltimore's good libraries.
