

Haiti Seeks Surrender of Air Raiders

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PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti,

June 6—Foreign Minister Rene Chalmers said Friday the British government will be asked to surrender any Haitians involved in Wednesday's fire bombing of the city.

Unverified reports received here said seven Americans and two Haitians were aboard the aircraft and were arrested later in the British Bahamas.

The bombing plane, a four-engine Constellation without national markings, dropped eight gasoline-filled drums on Port Au-Prince at noon Wednesday, leaving six known dead and causing minor damage.

President Francois Duvalier told the nation by radio yesterday that the aircraft came from South Cayos in the Bahamas, about 200 air miles north of here.

Three persons died directly as the result of the bombing, the government said. Among them was the six-month-old daughter of the gardener of U.S. Ambassador Claude G. Ross.
