## Arkansas Looks At Sweet Willie

FORREST CITY, Ark. — Picketing hit Forrest City again when 40 Negroes, members of the Committee for Peaceful Co-existence, paraded before the Office of Economic Opportunity and three downtown businesses where no Negroes are employed. Lance (Sweet Willie Wine) Watson, Memphis black militant, was on hand to help with the parade.

Yesterday's picketing was peaceful, with singing and clapping, said Rev. Cato Brooks, head of the movement. He said black people in Forrest City had presented a "five-point manifesto" to merchants stating their position.

• Black people will not shop in downtown Forrest City the statement said, until:

• Justice prevails and more jobs are available and black representatives are placed in city and county agencies.

• Until farmers receive the same minimum wage as other workers.

• Until black people have a decent drainage system in our section of the city.

• Until we have an equal number of black and white policemen with equal functions. (Rev. Cato said there are three black officers and they are not allowed to arrest white persons.)

• Election of aldermen by wards so that black people can nominate their own representatives to City Council.
