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Invader Ordered To Stand Trial

Rejecting a plea to abate a disorderly conduct indictment, Criminal Court Judge Perry Sellers yesterday ordered Lance 'Sweet Willie Wine' Watson, a self-styled leader of the black militant Invaders, to stand trial Oct. 27.

Phillip Kuhn, attorney for the tall, slim defendant, who wore his left arm in a cast from an encounter in Forrest City, Ark., argued that the statute under which Watson was indicted last fall is unconstitutional.

Mr. Kuhn said the statute, enacted after disturbances in the wake of Dr. Martin Luther King's slaying in 1968, is vague, broad and violates the First Amendment.

"Ten different men would interpret 10 different ways the language 'rude, boisterous, loud, offensive, blasphemous language or conduct, which threatens to be a breach of peace,'" Mr. Kuhn contended.

He announced he will appeal the test of the law's constitutionality to higher courts.

Watson was arrested in a disturbance at the Jump & Grab Drive-in Grocery at 591 Crump Sept. 21. He has been free under \$3,500 bond. A leader in protest marches and militant picketing at Forrest City, Watson was arrested in Little Rock Sunday on a disorderly conduct warrant sworn out in Forrest City.

He flew here from Little Rock Sunday evening.

Watson said he will start "Operation Breakfast" here Monday to serve a morning meal to 100 children of welfare families in the Foote Homes area.

Later, he said, he and a party will fly to San Francisco, Chicago, Miami and other cities to raise money for Operation Breakfast.
