Dear Mr. Lawrence,

Especially with yesterday's developments are I glad to get your letter of the 9th.

I'm home most of the time. I'm gone for brief periods in the mornings and evenings, taking my wife to and from work. Generally we are home all or most of Saturdays and Sundays. I'll be in Washington the 27th.

If you do not mind a suggestion and it presents no problem to you, I think it would be helpful if you could get xeroxes made of the pages of the Washington City Directory for the years beginning with 1965 and for the Washington Building only. This would run not more than two pages per year.

The point will be clear to Nelson or Ostrow when we meet.

The City and ~~Library~~ Congressional Libraries should have these directories.

If you do this before we get together, if you send them to me I will do in advance what should be done with them and save the time of your men.

And if it turns out that they want copies of anything I have, I have a copying machine.

I do not know their interests. Perhaps you and they don't yet. Two of those who figure in this are the subject of FBI reports in the residual Warren Commission files, Fiorini and Miguel Augustin Suarez. They say little. A reporter who borrowed my Suarez file months ago has not returned it. Nelson may have an academic interest in what the FBI did not say that it could and I think should have. In any event, if you want these, the Fiorini copies will be better if made from the unclear originals and I don't have those on Suarez (including the denied prediction that JFK would be killed two weeks before it happened), so perhaps the best way would be to get them from the National Archives. The total cost would be about \$1.00. The number to call is 963-4092. Ask for Mr. Simmons.

It has not been possible for me to check what I've heard, that Bebe Rebozo's wife's maiden name is Barker, as in Bernard, if that interests you.

Glad nobody went to jail! But with yesterday's developments, I find myself wondering why Bittman of all the lawyers made the demand for your tapes, especially when I believe that under such decisions as Jencks the demand was premature.


