MARK LANE AND DICK GREGORY REEXAMINE DR. KING DEATH

Prentice-Hall reports it is rushing toward an April 4 pub date for "Code Name 'Zorro': The Murder of Martin Luther King, Jr." by Mark Lane and Dick Gregory. The book is being published in conjunction with Pocket Books, which will print a paper edition at a later date.

Lane and Gregory have exhaustively investigated the King assassination, the publisher says, examining the circumstances, events and people involved. Lane states: "Our inquiry has raised serious doubts about the official version of the murder." Gregory adds: "And our book answers many of the disturbing questions about those events in Memphis."

These questions include the puzzle of why the Department of Justice assigned the same FBI force to investigate King's murder that J. Edgar Hoover had previously selected to "destroy" King.

Prentice-Hall reiterates that "Zorro" was the code name for King used by the special group inside the FBI which had been directed to "destroy" him.



A book that will ride the rails into the past is Holt, Rinehart and Winston's May title by Dee Brown, "Hear That Lonesome Whistle Blow: Railroads in the West."
