Johnson Won't Discuss Kennedy Book, Bars Aides From Dispute

Magazine's Story Called Inaccurate Special to The Inquirer And Washington Post_

AUSTIN, Tex., Dec. 26.-President Johnson will not discuss the controversial book, "The Death of a President," and he has instructed his staff to refrain from discussing it. White House press secretary George Christian said on Monday.

Christian made these disclosures when questioned about Newsweek magazine's report

Mr. Johnson has not seen the manuscript of the forthcoming book by William Manchester, Christian said. Nor has he seen the text of the Newsweek report of his own memories of that fateful day.

'NO INTERVIEWS'

But based on news accounts of the magazine story, on the stands on Monday, Christian took issue with Newsweek's sources and information.

"The President has granted no interviews to anyone, including Mr. Manchester, and has asked his staff to refrain from discussing the subject of the book," Christian said.
