Dear Mr. Cutler,

Thanks for your note and the copy of the letter to LIFE. Actually, the story of the "logical" bullet with the built-in intelligence is much worse than you indicate, much more improbable, really impossible.

Because of your interest in it, I tell you about a monograph just published by Randell Publications, P.O. Box 32362, Los Angeles, Calif. (\$5.05, including postage). In it Ray Marcus has drawn together much of the available information about this bullet and its strange career. No one else has done as much with it. I read it in rough draft and cannot praise it too highly.

I believe others in your area, through correspondence, might also be interested in this work, if you can inform any bookstores of its availability. I hope it achieves a publishing success for the time has now come for specialization in aspects of the evidence (see the current Soc. Eve. Post, which says pretty much the same thing in an editorial). Its success might encourage others.

Dear Ray, Steve Barber was glad to get The Eastard and commented favorably on it yesterday when we spoke briefly. I'll fly to Chicago shortly to debate Almer Gertz and Jenner on EBEM-TV, and it would be good to know more. Bill knows (possibly I told you and Maggie) what they did to me. And the Metromedia confrontation is tentatively on again. They've rung Lane in on my side, which I regard as a liability, and Wizer has arisen as the defender of the staff. He may be joined by others and thinks his appearance will reinforce the Liebel and Specter spines. It is tentatively set for 1/30-1. I've sold the reprint rights to chapter II of I, The False Oswald, to Sage, for too little but enough to recoup my costs on the trip out to see you people. I also think the time for this aspect is now here. Castor has sent me word through a mutual friend that he'd like to see me. I've replied any time and under any condition he wants, including in the studio of the mutual friend who has a recording business. He is a Walker friend, etc., and may have acknowledged his participation in gun-running. He is perturbed, I'm told. It can happen as early as Tuesday. Two more magazines are working in the archive. The Ruby stuff was declassified Friday when I took Mike Berlin of the NYPost there. Penn and I were on Jerry Williams with Dick Gregory, all three by phone, Monday night. It was good.
