Sir:

Friday, I was coming into the City Hall through the basement when Oswald was brought in. Immediately behind them was the uniformed officer with the woman witness to Tippitt's murder. She was hysterical and told the officer she couldn't face him (Oswald) again. I had the officer wait for the next elevator and then had him place her in my office and close the door because I felt like she couldn't make it through the hall with so many reporters there. I then went to the homicide office and told them and they asked me to keep her there. When Captain Frits came by, I also told him and he said okay. I then left the officer and Mrs. Schell with the witness, and King (rookie) and I stayed in the hall. Shortly after all of this happened, a uniformed officer came to me and pointed out a man in the hall and said that he had inquired about his brother whom he thought was arrested earlier in the day. He told the officer that seasons from the Republic Bank had called him and told him he had been arrested (before the parades). He was concerned because his brother had gone "off his rocker." I told the officer to get this man's name and his brother's name and we would try to find out something for him. The officer returned and said the man had gotten on the elevator and left. He asked his name and he said to just forget it, and left. He did mention the name Fuglin to the officer.

The reason for this note is that I only got a glimpse of this man, but I believe it was the man in this picture. I couldn't and wouldn't swear to it.

I don't know the uniformed officer's name, but believe he was on duty on the 3rd floor at that time. He was a large man and may work traffic.
