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Dear Editor,

If you want your columns used in George McMillan's personal vendettas and a review for you used as the basis for pretext calls to those he clearly intends to assault in your magazine, then fine - it is working out that way. So far.

It struck me as odd when George phoned me several days ago to tell me he is doing a review of the newest assassination paranoia, by David Lifton.
