President Johnson and Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara already have denied that there are any such official studies on the probable duration of the war and the American troop strength required to win it In his prepared statement Greene said of his "deep back grounder" last Sunday:

"I did not make any reference to any Defense Department or JCS (Joint Chiefs of Staff) studies or any other study which contains conclusions on the length of the war or the number of U.S. forces required to conduct the war. know of no study which draws the conclusions re-ported and I will not speculate on the length of the war or the force levels required to support it."

## Questions Fired

Newsmen repeatedly fired questions at the Marine Commandant as to what he had said at the Saigon backgrounder. He would only repeat his earlier prepared statement and add that he would not speculate on U.S. troop strength and length of war prospects.

Some of the questions were sharp. One reporter asked, "why won't you level with Greene remained calm and turned off all queries. There was one softer question, however, which seemed to explain the whole matter of what Greene may have said to correspondents a week ago and why he and other top officials feel they now can deny that there have been any Pentagon "studies' on the Vietnam war.

A reporter noted that Pentagon "studies," under military procedure, usually referred to formal inquiries into a subject ordered by higher authority with the findings and conclusions put into a definite report. He went on to ask if military staffs were not constantly making estimates and speculations on all matters, includding the possible length of war.

Greene agreed, saying his Marine Corps staff, "like all other staffs," was "constantly
