Mitchell Lays Distrust in U.S. to LBJ

Attorney General John N. Mitchell charged last night that political "deception" by the Johnson administration is the reason so many Americans distrust the federal government.

Striking the most partisan notes of his 10 months in office, Mitchell said there is a national "disease of cynicism" thanks to Johnson administration promises that never were kept.

Mitchell, the trusted political adviser to President Nixon, made the charge in a speech prepared for a \$100-a-plate fund-raising dinner in Milwaukee-for the Republican Party of Wisconsin.

He said the Nixon administration, "purposely low key" in its public utterances in contrast to its prefiecessors, was on its way to restoring public confidence and would "restore | civil tranquility to the streets of this nation."
