## Sheridan Granted Stay of Jury Quiz

spiracy charges.

Sheridan entered a plea of innocence yesterday. He is free on \$5,000 bond. Judge Brahney gave his attorneys 30 days to file special pleadings.

THE CHARGES AGAINST
Sheridan grew out of a June
19 NBC program which
charged that Garrison's case
against Shaw is based in part
on perjured testimony. The
program said Russo failed a
lie detector test before he
went on the stand during a
preliminary hearing.

Sheridan was subpensed by the grand jury when he appeared here last week to answer the public bribery charges. His lawyers have charged the subpensa constitutes harassment.

In three other rulings yesterday, Judge Bagert tossed out a Sheridan plea to have Garrison removed as legal adviser to the grand jury; refused to permit Sheridan's attorney to accompany him into the jury room, and said the foreman is not compelled to announce in advance what questions will be asked.
