Re Greenstine's envelope addressed to Nagell from South Pasadena and the legend and flag attached, the most direct answer to your question, "What do you make of this" is nothing. With at least one nut involved, how can one make sense out of anything, even when it may be real? The envelope shows no signs of ever having been sealed, this if having had no contents. The legend on the flap is crazy, both in presence there and contents. Because it is in quotes, I do not identify quote. But for such a message, such a place? Unless it was added by Nagell in sending it to G., after removing contents. The envelope is of the kind used for a greeting card, not correspondence. In any event, I regard any suggestion of real or imagined Communists being involved in any of the assassination as unworthy of a second's serious consideration.

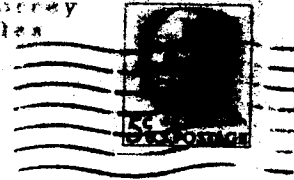
I return what you sent herewith. Maybe you know someone who would like the pin? If you do, I have a similar one of better quality.
