Thanks for your prompt reply and the references. I shall not be able to use them now. There just isn't time. Because this will arrive in your absence, I hope someone will open and read it. I want to remind you that you that what I said of the content of my forthcoming book was for you information only. I do want to prevent any inadvertent use of it.

I am satisfied for the officially-inspired skepticism to continue. I have just finished writing about that. The truth just hasn't dawned because there is no analysis. I'd rather have it come out in a meaningful context.

I will call when I get to New York, but at that time I will have completed the book. I then hope to get it out of my mind to finish the next one, already begun and laid aside for this, and to then get back on WHITEWASH III, which I think will be unusually important.

It will answer many questions and in its own way will address what I so much fear, the potential of a Reichstag-fire situation in the awful mess.


Dear Mr. Weisberg:
