## Attorney + Not Allowed

Memphis attorney Richard J. Ryan attempted to visit James Earl Ray in the state prison Vesterday but was ficials.

Harry S. Avery, state con missioner of corrections, Rvan has not been officially retained and will not be allowed to see Ray until after the prisoner has been classified next month.

AT THE SAME time, a decision was handed down by the Tennessee Supreme Court yesterday which could adversely affect any affort by Ray to set aside his 99-year sentence for the murder of Dr. Martin Luther King.

The court, in an opinion by Justice Allison B. Humphreys, ruled that a convicted criminal cannot seek to invalidate a prison sentence on grounds he was misadvised by his attorney to plead guilty.

In Memphis, a prosecutor in the Ray Case, Exec. Asst. Dist. Atty. Gen. Robert K. Dwyer, praised the high court ruling as "assuring more than ever that Ray's convic-tion will stand."

Jerry Ray said last week his brother would seek a new trial in Memphis on grounds he was "pressured" by his

time Jerry Ray identified the attorney as "A. J. Ryman."

HOWEVER. Ryan indicated to prison officials yesterday he was the attorney contacted by Ray. His request to talk to the prisoner about the possi-bility of being retained was denied.

Ryan reportedly was en route back to Memphis last night and was not available for comment.
