I will not make a special trip to New York for this. I will be there about the 24th, at the Chelsea, but I doubt I'll have a free moment.

When you return from California if you feel like giving me a full account, please do. But if you have any apprehension at all, please forget about all.

I do not mean to seem impolite but working the hours I do I have no time for unnecessary correspondence

I just read in the Bergen Record this week about the unusual deaths of witnesses who were in Dallas. I don't want to live in fear the rest of my life that someone might have me bumped off.

I can give you almost all of the information that you requested in your letter, but first I must know that I can trust you. I won't know this until I meet you.

I will be driving to W. Va.
to visit with my mother
the latter part of this month.
I usually spend the night
near Charlestown, W. Va. as
I don't like to make the
entire trip in one day. If I
recall correctly, I usually
take 84 South to Lexington, Va.

If it is convenient with you,
I could meet you near Frederick,
Md. I can write to you
concerning the date that I
plan to leave. If this arrange-
ment isn't convenient, I can
meet you some time during
the day whenever you are in
N.Y.C. again.

Before I give you any
more information, I must
know that the information
will be held confidential &
that I can trust you.

I have never read any of your books, but I do look forward to reading them in the future. I never knew there was a threat against JFK in Miami. I never read anything about it in the newspaper.

I will be in Calif. for a couple of days some time this month. I will answer your letter if I receive one when I return.
