Dear Harold:

Thought there was very little coverage on JFK on the Nov. 22. Glad your show went well.


I watched part of the morning shows and as much of the nightly news as possible, did not see one thing.

JUST PLAIN CAR-A-ZY! Souped-up car rockets man to his death

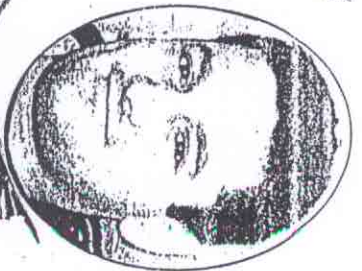
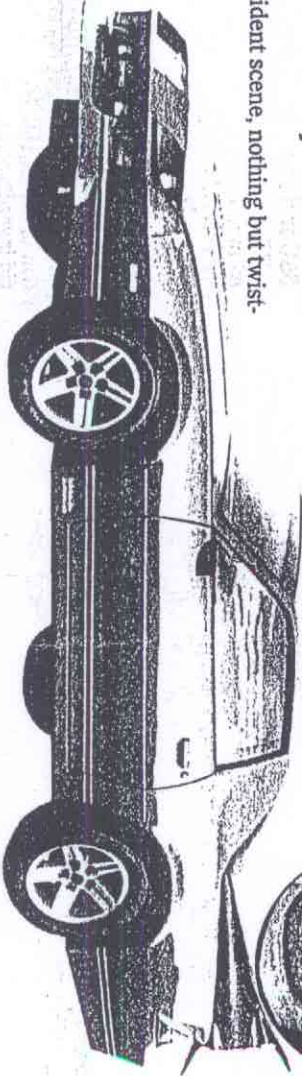
A MAN who loved to drive sports cars at high speeds died after he attached a solid fuel rocket to his car and hurtled uncontrollably into a cliff at 350 miles per hour.

When cops arrived at the accident scene, nothing but twisted metal was left of Danny Melva's hot rod 1974 Chevrolet Camaro.

"It didn't even look like a car," says an Arizona state trooper. "It was the worst wreck I've ever seen, like the site of an airplane crash."

Only upon closer inspection of the mass destruction did investigators realize that the auto fatality was one for the record books. They found that a JATO (Jet Assisted Take Off) unit had been attached to the automobile to give it extra power.

"A JATO is actually a solid fuel rocket," explains Professor Lawrence Frankel. "It's used to give an extra push to heavy military transport planes taking off from

small airfields. It certainly was never meant for automobiles."

Investigators say Melva apparently secured a JATO from unknown sources, drove to the outskirts of Phoenix, Arizona, and attached the fuel rocket to his car. When he floored the gas pedal, the

car zoomed to a speed greater than 350 mph.

"The whole thing took less than 30 seconds," says Professor Frankel. "The victim experienced G-forces like an F-14 pilot would and then crashed into the cliff after applying the brakes. The vehicle was actually airborne for

the last 400 yards. At that speed, the brakes had completely melted and were totally ineffective.

The tires blew out and the car left the ground before exploding into the cliff. Mr. Melva never had a prayer of surviving such a high-impact crash." The gruesome mishap

left thick skid marks on the isolated desert road - and a three-foot-deep crater in the cliff into which he crashed. Most of the victim's remains were not recoverable.

Authorities are now investigating how Melva was able to secure a JATO rocket.
