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'Spirited' Suggestions for Mr. Nixon's Gift List

President Nixon is decking the halls with everybody, from North Vietnam to the American press, whoever happened to get in his way. So in that spirit, and in the hope he will overlook no needy cases, here is a list of Christmas gift suggestions for Mr. Nixon.

To Henry Kissinger, for his prediction that peace was at hand: a letter of introduction, signed by Ambassador Ellsworth Bunker, to President Nguyen Van Thieu of South Vietnam.

To Attorney General Richard Kleindienst, for his investigations of the Watergate case and the ITT settlement: a seeing-eye dog.

To Martha Mitchell, for doing so much to call attention to the Watergate scandal: a telephone.
