R. Sargent Shriver, the 1972 Democratic vice presidential nominee, opposes any immunity from criminal prosecution for Mr. Nixon.

"The President is under the law like everyone else," said Shriver, who will conduct a symposium on legal services Monday. "And I think he's responsible for his actions just as any grownup is responsi-ble."
