Nixons at Camp David

CAMP DAVID, Md., Nov. 22 (AP)—President Nixon put in a half-day at the White House and then flew by helicopter to Camp David for Thanksgiving dinner with members of his family and his close friend, C. G. (Bebe) Rebozo.

The President arrived at his Maryland mountaintop retreat on a sunny fall day just in time to catch holiday afternoon football games on television.

Aides said the Nixons had their traditional turkey dinner in the early evening.

The President is expected to stay at Camp David for the four-day holiday weekend. Deputy press secretary Gerald L. Warren said Mr. Nixon would be working on recommendations received from his Cabinet-level, Energy Emergency Action Group on ways to deal with the growing fuel shortages.

Mr. Nixon also will be kept advised of foreign policy developments over the weekend, Warren said.

While a heavy morning fog shrouded Camp David, the President remained in Washington in the morning, meeting in his Oval Office with Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger for a half hour, going over Middle East and

other foreign policy matters, and conferring with his chief of staff, Alexander M. Haig Jr., and press secretary Ronald L. Ziegler.

Mr. Nixon's older daughter, Tricia, and her husband, Edward Cox, flew from New York Wednesday night.

Absent from the family gathering here was the Nixons' younger daughter, Julie, and her husband, David Eisenhower. They went to have Thanksgiving dinner and a family reunion at the home of David's parents, former Ambassador and Mrs. John Eisenhower, in Phoenixville, Pa.
