Dear Dick:

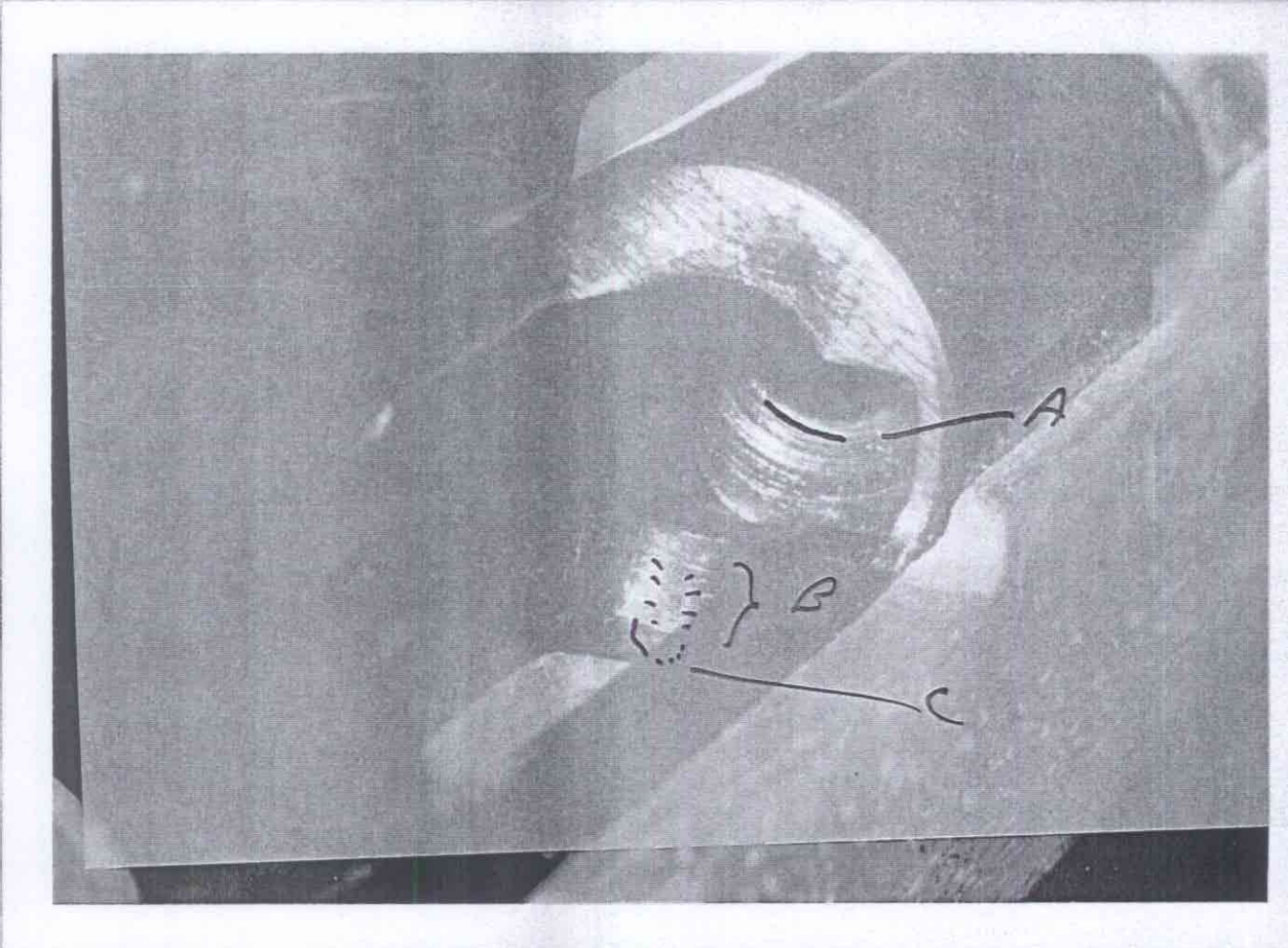
Enclosed is black-white print of the breech of the gun a 2 x 2 transparency of which I previously sent you. On the overlay I have inked in lines which, on the color, you will notice are yellow brass being the result of "dry runs" from empty cartridge lips striking these particular places. Lines "A" and "C" always result in dents compatible with that on CE 543. Lines "B" result in a bilobed symmetrical dent not apparent on any of the Commission Exhibits. This is the prevailing situation with six of the eight guns I have had at various times. I can no longer have access to the other two weapons.

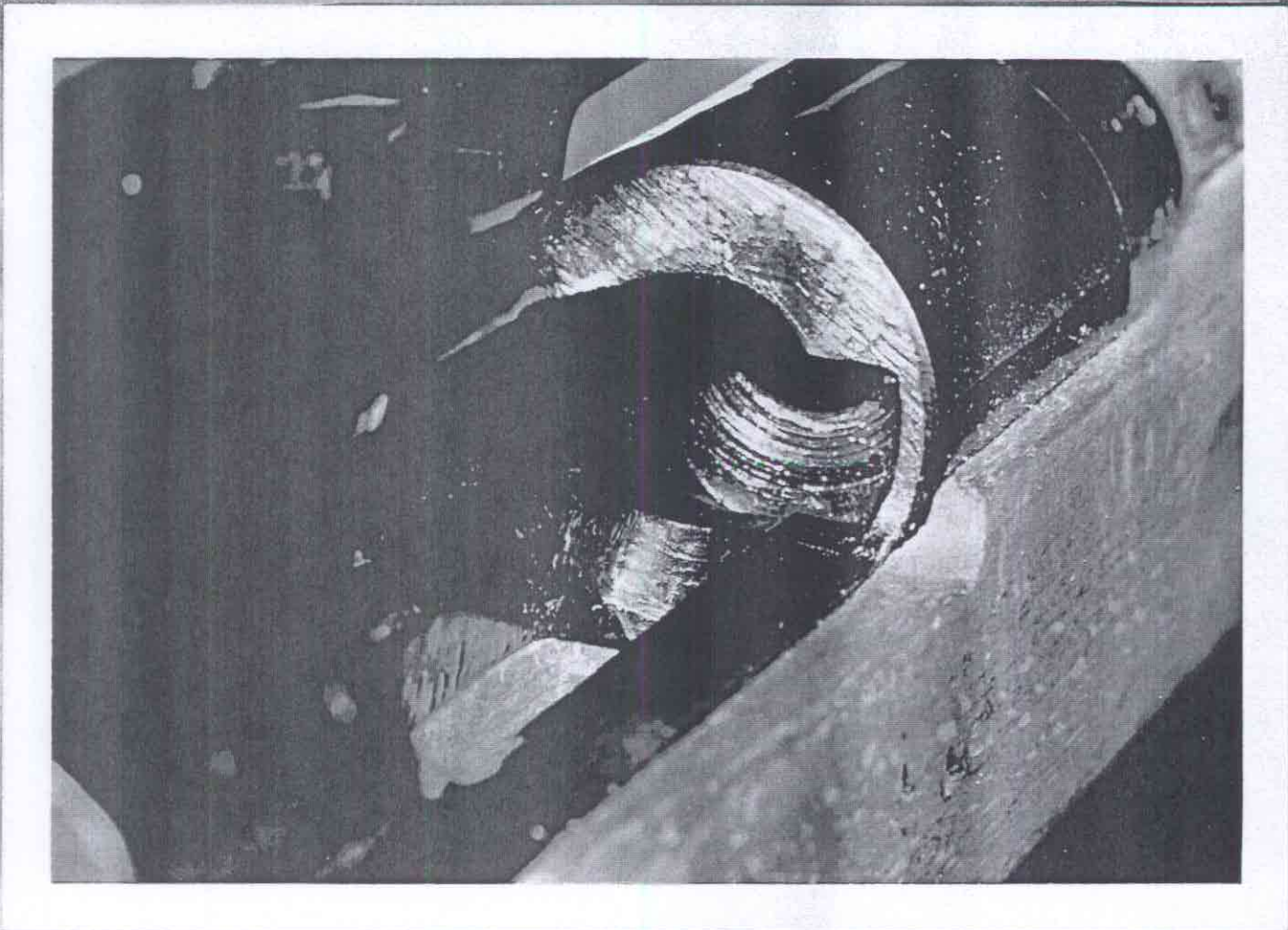
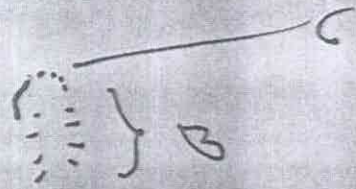
