SUBJECT: LEE HARVEY OSWALD, aka IS-R-CUBA

Section Chief WILLIAM A. BRANIGAN, Seat of Government, telephonically contacted ASAC CLARK, 6/23/64, with reference to the newspaper articles in "The Dallas Morning News" by Reporter AYNESWARTH. It was desired to know how the information concerning OSWALD's diary and other items had been released to the newspaper. Mr. BRANIGAN stated that this information should be determined discreetly without outside inquiry. In addition, Mr. BRANIGAN desired to know if there were any Commission members presently in Dallas. He was advised that, to the knowledge of the Dallas Office, LEON HUBERT was the only individual from the Commission presently in Dallas.

After review of Dallas files, Mr. BRANIGAN was advised that pheto copies of Items 1 through 455 had been furnished to . the Dallas Police Department (Assistant Chief CHARLES BATCHELOR) on 12/31/63. These items were furnished to the Bureau by inventory - dated 11/27/63. ... 301 27 mag 100 4

In addition, Mr. BRANIGAN was advised that the inventory number for the diary which had been published was unknown; however, the items published in the June 28th issue of "The Dallas Morning News were as follows:

> to OSWALD was Item The letter from CP , USA,

The Undesirable Discharge for OSWALD was Item 2.)

The vaccination

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All of these items were obtained from the 1026 North Beckley address by the Dallas Police Department, while the diary was obtained from the PAINE residence.

During telephonic contact with Mr. BRANIGAN, he was advised that Assistant District Attorney WILLIAM F. ALEXANDER had visited the Dallas Office, on 6/4/64, and made the request that he be furnished photo copies of all property obtained by the Dallas Police Department and turned over to the FBI. He stated that these photos were desired by District Attorney WADE, who was to testify before the President's Commission. It was stated at that time that WADE was already in the east to testify before the Commission. Copies of the photos were not furnished to Mr. ALEXANDER, as he was referred to the Dallas Police Department, who had a complete set.

In addition, Mr. BRANIGAN was advised that initial check of the Dallas files fails to indicate any record of dissemination of these photos to Secret Service in Dallas.

All of the above information was telephonically furnished to SAC SHANKLIN in Washington, D. C., on the same date.

Mr. SHANKLIN stated that, from his memory, it had been agreed that copies of all photos would be furnished to Agent in Charge SORRELIS, of the Secret Service, Dallas, and that had been done as, at a later date, Mr. SORRELIS had informed SAC SHANKLIN that all photos furnished by the FBI in Dallas had been forwarded to their headquarters in Washington D. C. Mr. SHANKLIN requested that we make additional check of our files to determine how many copies of the photos were furnished to the Dallas Office by the Bureau and make an accounting for same.

At 10:45 AM, 6/29/64, daptain FRITZ, Dallas PD, telephonically advised MARINA OSWAID's attorney had been in touch with him, had advised of having called the Commission relative to the material published in Dallas News over the weekend, and that the Commission had inferred or said the lead could have been only from Dallas PD.

PRITZ said he has information that someone from another agency was in the FBI Office a week or so ago seeking photographs of the OSWALD material and desired to know whether such was the case; if so, who, and if the material was furnished to the unnamed person.

FRITZ was advised this matter would be referred to personnel more familiar with the matter, and it was promptly brought to ASAC CLARK's and Supervisor GEMBERLING's attention.

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Addendum:

At 10:55 AM, 6/29/64, ASAC KYLE G. CLARK telephonically contacted Supervisor JOHN STOKES, at the Bureau, concerning the above-mentioned call from Captain/FRITZ. STOKES advised that, in the event he did not advise to the contrary by 11:20 AM, 1t would be satisfactory for the Dallas Office to advise Captain FRITZ that on 6/4/64, WILLIAM F. ALEXANDER, Asst. District Attorney, Dallas County, Texas, had made inquiry of the Dallas

Office seeking a set of photographs of the items obtained by the Dallas PD and subsequently turned over to the FBI. On this occasion, SAC SHANKLIN advised Mr. ALEXANDER that the Dallas PD had been furnished a set of these photographs and he might desire to make inquiry there in connection with his desire to obtain a copy of same.

At 11:33 AM, 6/29/64, Captain WILL PRITZ, of the Dallas PD, was telephonically advised by SA ROBERT P. GEMBERLING of the visit by Mr. ALEXANDER and of his referral to the Dallas PD. Captain FRITZ was further advised that this office did not know if Mr. ALEXANDER had made contact with the Dallas PD thereafter, at which time Captain FRITZ stated that Mr. ALEXANDER had made contact but that no set of such photographs was furnished to him.

Captain FRITZ stated that, inasmuch as the Dallas PD did not make same available to anyone, it was obvious that such photographs could have been made available by several other sources and then specifically inquired, "Did your office give them to anyone?"

Captain FRITZ was advised that under no circumstances had this office furnished a set of photographs to Mr. AIEXANDER or anyone else not authorized to receive same.

Telephonic Anguiry was made of Section Chief BRANIGAN and Inspector STERLING B. DONAHOE concerning newspaper articles in "The Dallas Morning News" to the effect that the President's Commission, namely, J. LEE RANKIN, had requested the FBI to make inquiry as to how the Morning News came into possession of OSWALD's diary and other items published in the Saturday and Sunday editions.

Mr. DONAHOE advised that the Commission had been contacted concerning this request and, to date, no instructions had been received. He stated confidentially that It was recommended to the Commission that they call JACK KRUEGER and the publisher of "The mallas Morning News before the Commission, rather than the PBI making inquiry.

Any inquiry from the press should be answered, "No comment, and the fact that "we are conducting no inquiry at this time."

LEAK OF INFORMATION AS CARRIED IN THE "DALLAS MORNING NEWS", 6/27-28/64

At approximately 2:30 PM, this date, Inspector JAMES R. MALLEY telephonically advised a letter had been received by the Director from the Commission, dated 6/30/64. Attached was the following resolution:

"It was moved by Congressman FORD and seconded by Senator RUSSELL; resolved, that the Commission ask the Federal Bureau of Investigation to immediately make a thorough investigation of the publication of the LEE HARVEY OSWALD diary by the "Dallas Morning News" and that it ascertain both the means used and the circumstances surrounding the acquisition of the diary and its subsequent application, and that the Federal Bureau of Investigation also be asked to make a like investigation of any similar publication that may occur in the immediate future. Motion was carried unanimously."

Also, the following was included:

"Will you kindly keep us advised of the developments in this matter?"

Mr. MALLEY advised the info obtained can be reported in a dissemination memo or report form in above caption.

The Director has instructed that this investigation should receive expeditious handling.

At 4:50 PM, this date, I received an anonymous telephone call in which the caller furnished the following:

Caller stated that if the FBI was seeking information about the diary they should check on SNOOKY DAVIS. Caller stated he had definite information that DAVIS, who is employed as an investigator for the Dallas DA's Office and who is a close associate of Assistant DA BILL ALEXANDER, was the one who originally picked up the diary and thereafter reproduced six copies of same. One of these copies was given to Newsweek Magazine and another was given to CARL PREUND, a reporter for The Dallas Morning News. Caller stated that \$15,000 exchanged hands. Caller then stated that ALEXANDER still has the remaining four copies.

Caller stated that Assistant DA_JIM_ACWIE was present during the meeting in the County Jail between JACK RUBY and Chief Justice EARL WARREN. After the meeting, BOWIE submitted a report to DA HENRY WADE. Caller stated ALEXANDER got hold of a copy of this report and furnished it to a reporter on The Dallas Morning News.

Caller at this point refused to furnish his identity or the source of his information, other than to describe it as highly reliable and then hung up.

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
