Dear Paul,

You sent me CD 194, pp. 1, 3-7 inc.

From the summary, there are things in here that could be of interest, including the reports of Oswald's contacts with the media (names not given in summary). Are these the names in his notebook? If they are not, is there added significance in the notebook names?

That 100 block of Camp is a touchy area. It seems that the FBI interviewed no one in it until forced to by Mrs. Herard and then as I note in what I will send, ignore the 117 address in the notebook. Ronnie Caire, to whom Oswald applied for a job, was in that block-not asked, yet he knew Oswald. Also Arcacha. Thus, with the other things in the memo, I am very interested in the balance of this document.

It may be without significance, but those questioned after Mrs. Herard all worked on the same side of ~~the~~ Camp St, except one of the newsies at the far corner, and would have been less likely to see anything. Those on the odd side, like Gemelli, could have seen the distribution.

Relative to the location of WILLIAM CUTHBERT BRADY, named on December 2, 1963, by Mrs. DOLORES NEELEY, Secretary, Room 101, International Trade Mart, New Orleans, Louisiana, as possibly in a position to identify individuals represented in photographs taken on August 16, 1963, at the International Trade Mart, 124 Camp Street, New Orleans, Louisiana, and furnished for the use of the FBI by television station WDSU, Confidential Informant Dallas T-17 advised that approximately the first week in August, 1963, BRADY moved to the Philippine Islands and was residing in the city of Manila.
