JOSEPH LEROY DONNELS, Superintendent, "Union Printing, the Federationists", 3200 Burgundy, New Orleans, Louisiana, phone number 943-1345, residing at 63 Old Hickory Avenue, Chalmette, Louisiana, phone number 271-4255, advised that although to his knowledge OSWALD never applied for employment with Union Printing, formerly located at 426 Chartres Street, he feels sure that he has seen the man pictured in photograph displayed to him. DONNELS stated "This person or someone who looks just like him was in the Austin Inn at 416 Chartres Street during the first few months of this year". This person was only seen once at this time, "He was acting strange and seemed like he didn't want anyone near him". DONNELS advised this person gave an outwardly hostile appearance to someone looking at him. DONNELS advised that he recalls this incident because the individual involved resembled his brother-in-law.

The Commission's files abound in identifications of Osweld when the genuine article was not likely the man seen. In New Orleans, this is often in the reports of FBI agents not active in the investigation. There is always the possibility of mistaken identifications.

What cannot be overlooked, however, is the possibility that some of these cases may have been the spotting of look-elikes one or more of whom may have been engaged in counterfeiting Oswald.

The man reported in CD 75:474 by Donnels was in the right ares to have been counterfeiting Oswald. It is close to that part of the French Cuarter where the real one lived, where he was often on his return to New Orleans, and the places he selected for his handbill distributions.

This description of "Oswald" does not really fit the real one, who was not usually unpleasant with people. It is not inconsistent with the character of Thornley, for example, nor with what Loren L. Butler reported (CD 75: 697).

As usual, the FBI fails to report significant information, such as the time of the day, physical description, dress, whether or not alone, etc.
