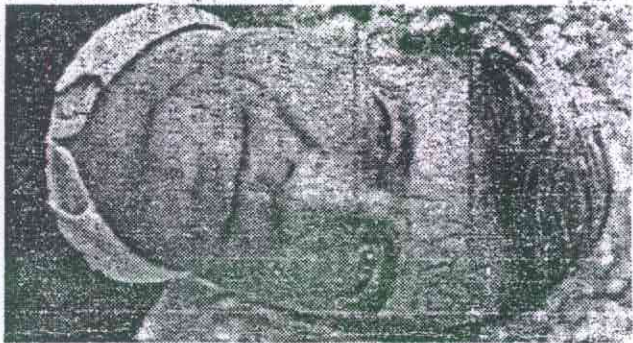

# A dud about Oswald

Oswald's Game. By Jean Davison. Norton, \$17.95.

Jean Davison takes as her premise the validity of the Warren Commis- sion's findings that Lee Harvey Os- wald, acting alone and for personal reasons, killed President John F. Kennedy. In an attempt to render this deed logical the text revolves around Oswald's character and his leftist

To achieve her end, a handful of the most irresponsible critics of this theory — the likes of Mark Lane and David Lifton — are set up as straw- men to be lambasted, at every turn and, with the brush of conspiracy theorist, tar all who levy criticism at the official doctrines.

All scholarly dissent is simply chopped from Davison's sources to enable her to embrace the congenial literature free from embarrassment. But the major flaw is the failure to use the 500,000 pages of documents forced into the public domain by re- sponsible critics.

Conditional statements suffice the text. On one page, I counted 12 "if this happened" and "might have been" phrases. In the end the author succumbs to rank theorizing, the very weakness she found to be despi- cable in the critics.

Save your money. "Oswald's Game" is a dud.
