A pawn against King?

More than 21 years after it happened, attempts to reveal the true circumstances about the murder of Martin Luther King at the Lorraine Motel in Memphis continue to fill books and inspire television documentaries. The official version is that King was shot from 200 yards by a small-time crook, James Earl Ray, now serving 99 years for the murder. Ray's version is that he was only a pawn in a wider conspiracy and did not fire the gun. John Edginton's film Who Killed Martin Luther King? (BBC1, 9.30pm) claims to offer new evidence, not only of a conspiracy, but one leading straight to the heart of government. During the 1960s King was not only leading the movement for black civil rights but was an outspoken critic of the war in Vietnam. On the second count, particularly, he was on a collision course

with the President, Lyndon Johnson. Is it too postmodern to believe that the Central Intelligence Agency, fearing that King had become a tool of Communist China, organized his demise, perhaps with the help of Mafia hit men? One is entitled to be sceptical when mere television crews appear to unearth evidence that has mysteriously eluded the experts, though if there was a conspiracy involving government agencies then it is feasible that anything which challenged the "lone nutter" thesis would be suppressed. At any rate, the film is a compelling piece of detective work which has managed to track down an impressive range of witnesses and, like all good investigative journalism, constantly asks the awkward questions.

P. G. Wodehouse and Iris Murdoch are among those to be profiled in the new season of Bookmark (BBC2, 8.10pm), but tonight's subject will (at least to most British viewers) be far less familiar. He is the venerable Greek poet, Yannis Ritsos, a lively 80-year-old and lifelong Communist whose verses have filled some 120 volumes and whose politics have brought him disfavour, imprisonment and exile. Roger Thompson's film eschews a rigidly biographical approach
