He enjoys good living and is anything but stingy. He is candid and perceptive, both wife and shrewd. He may be everly suspicious, but the suspicions run in the right direction.

I am entirely convinced his travels are for pleasure and relaxation and to forget the normal worries of the busy businessman. And he knows how to live well, how toenjoy the luxuries of life and to appreciate what for him are the essantials.
