The Dallas files start with 89 and 100 mumbers. I have you the number of the Dallas DeM file - have. Ruby files start with 44.

I never had the interest in DeM that Bud, "arrison and most others had so in making copies for "subject" filing I did not make extra copies of all DeM records I read and have. All for the first two years or so can be located through the Dallas special index I have. I'm sorry, all the Dallas ones can be. I have no HQ index. 
