Mr. Heymann:

I concur with the attached recommendation that we not prosecute John Ray for perjury.

I would emphasize that we have made every effort through John Ray's attorney to determine whether or not threat of prosecution or prosecution itself would result in any change in John Ray's testimony to the Committee. It seems clear from those conferences that Ray will persist in his position that his testimony concerning the bank robberies was accurate and truthful. This prosecution would in no way aid or assist the Committee's inquiry which might be an appropriate factor if the matter were an appropriate criminal prosecution standing alone. However, for the reasons well set forth in the attached memorandum, even that is not so, so we have what I think would be a no win prosecution which would serve neither the Committee's interest nor our interests.

- 2. Uncle of the Rays, William Maher, lived in Alton.
- James Earl bought a car for \$200 within 20 miles of Alton, the day after the robbery.
- 4. John Bay admil: being around St. Louis about that Lime.
- 5. William Rife was originally slated to bestify that John Ray had said he and James Earl took part in bank robberies together 1967-1968. This testimony apparently won't pan out, and Rife will simply say that James Earl was said to have taken part in 1967-1968 robberries.
- 6. Gowren was well acquainted with the Rays at the time of the robbery. By John's account, he may have borrowed John's visiting card to see James Earl the day before James Earl's escape on April 23, 1957.
