Clears Staff On Secrets

The Warren Commission yesterday unanimously cleared Prof. Norman Redlich and all other staff members to handle classified information.

By its action, the seven-member Commission rejected charges that Redlich might be a security risk because of his affiliation with the Emergency Civil Liberties Committee, an alleged Red front.

The Commission was named by President Johnson to investigate the assassination of President Kennedy.

In its statement the Commission said that it had reviewed all of the field investigations concerning the security clearance of its employes day on charges of spying for and had "unanimously cleared all of the members of its staff to handle classified informal news agency PAP said. tion."

Three Republican Representatives and one Republican Senator have criticized the Commission for hiring Redlich in view of his association with the Emergency Civil Liberties Committee, which in the 1950s was labeled a Communist front organization by two committees of Congress.

Redlich, a New York University law professor, listed the affiliation when he applied for o employment with the Commis-to sion. He has explained that he n became involved with the it group because of his deep belief in civil liberties.
