You are so right in your advice about the need for female companionship. But this is something I know from much experience. While I am admittedly shy (and I think this is lessening progressively), I have never had any barriers toward girls. My involvement with them began before I can remember, and progressed generally more ahead of people my own age.

Your reflections on Mary bring to mind a girl which I once loved and points out the differences between our generations. From this girl more than any others I ever knew did I learn of the many and deep comforts of a woman, and the rewards of a close relationship.

But I did lay her.

Right now I do long for female companionship, for as of late it has struck me that I have become close with no girls here. I have developed some very good relationships with boys here, which of course is only partially fulfilling and in a different way. But I am learning much about human relationships which I did not or would not learn before. We can talk about this.

If I recall correctly, the last time I was there you mentioned having two very good stereo speakers which were too large to be used by you, and that you wanted to get rid of them. A very close friend of mine here has an excellent system but

no speakers. He's been having trouble finding some, for he would like to buy them used. If you still have yours and they are in line with what he has in mind, he will gladly pay you for them.
