Andrews Motion Ruling Slated

Criminal District Court Judge Frank J. Shea, who presided over the perjury trial in which Dean A. Andrews Jr. was convicted, is expected to rule Thursday on Andrews motions for a new trial and an arrested judgment.

The arrested judgment motion, if granted, will allow Andrews to be released on bail while his attorneys take steps necessary to begin an appeal of the conviction before the state

supreme court.

Andrews was found guilty early Monday on three of five perjury counts concerning assassia nation conspiracy testimony be-fore the Orleans Parish grand

jury.
The counts included testimony by Andrews that he could not identify conspiracy defendam. Clay L. Shaw as the mysterious "Clay Bertrand," who, Andrews told the Warren Commission, called him about representing Lee Harvey Oswald after the assassination of President John

assassination of President John F. Kennedy.
District Attorney Jim Garrison claims that Shaw used the alias "Bertrand" and participated in a conspiracy to murder President Kennedy.
In another development Tuesday three men subpenaed by the grand jury appeared for questioning.
They are Byron Chiverton, whose connection with the case is unexplained, Steven R. Plotkin, attorney for Gordon Novel,

is measuramed, Steven R. Plot-kin, attorney for Gordon Novel, sought by Garrison as a materi-al witness, and Rancier Ehlin-ger, a former associate of No-vel.
