

JUDGE BARS DELAY IN TRIAL OF SHAW

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 13 (AP) — District Judge Edward A. Haggerty Jr. refused today to delay or move the scheduled Jan. 21 trial of Clay L. Shaw on charges of conspiring to assassinate President Kennedy.

Judge Haggerty denied defense motions to quash District Attorney Jim Garrison's charges against Shaw and for a change of venue to move the trial outside New Orleans.

Judge Haggerty said that he would release grand jury subpoenas for new trial evidence on Jan. 14. He had already rejected the defense motion to delay the trial. He turned them down last week, too.

Mr. Shaw's attorney, E. Brian Doherty, applied for dismissal of the charges against Mr. Shaw under state and federal laws against conspiracy statutes as unconstitutional.

The United States District Court in New Orleans rejected the same arguments in a trial Mr. Shaw had last week. Mr. Garrison said he would appeal.

The state trial against Mr. Shaw was the first of several in the very period with the tower built but of other.
