Expected to Take Stand Today in Shaw Trial

The trial of Clay L. Shaw is g scheduled to resume at 9 a. m. Monday in the Criminal District Court building, Tulane and Il Broad.

Perry Raymond Russo, 26, Garrison's controversial star witness who has testified earlier that he attended a party in 1963 at which the proposed assassination of the late President John F. Kennedy was discussed, is expected to take the stand.

Russo says Shaw was one of the plotters.

Shaw has been accused by Dist. Atty. Jim Garrison of conspiring in the assassination, along with Lee Harvey Oswald and David W. Ferrie.

The defense says Shaw, 55, a

Monday will be the fourth day of actual testimony in the case and Garrison's chief prosecutor, James L. Alcock, said as court adjourned Saturday, "Perry Raymond Russo is our next witness."

During testimony Friday and Saturday, Charles I. Spiesel, a New York accountant, told of still another 1963 party purport-edly laced with assassination talk and allegedly attended by Shaw and Ferrie.

Jury, judge, lawyers and de-fendant trailed Spiesel Saturday in the French Quarter, but found only a place "similar" to the one he told about.

Russo, a book salesman, testified at a 1967 preliminary hearing that he listened to Shaw laying plans with two nedy.

The other two, Russo said, were Oswald and Ferrie. Ferrie was a former airline pilot.
