NEW JFK MOVIE SMEARS JACKIE O BY HINTING AT AFFAIR WITH BODYGUARD

Oliver Stone epic even suggests she clambered over back of limo to reach Secret Service lover

ACKIE ONASSIS was having a torrid White House love affair with a rugged Secret Service agent—and, more incredibly, she even tried to protect him the moment her husband was being assassinated.

That's the outrageous claim Oliver Stone is pushing in his film JFK, about the 1963 assassination of President

John F. Kennedy, which the Hollywood director is currently filming in Dallas.

Jackie's family is stunned at reports Stone's reenactment of the horrific assassination scene suggests Jackie tried to help the agent jump into the blood-spattered car to protect HIM from Lee Harvey Oswald's gunshots.

Canadian actress Jodie Farber, the unknown lookalike tapped to play the former First Lady, has been banned by Stone from revealing what he or she thinks Jackie was actually doing when she hurled herself over the back of the car as shots rang out.

"It's made clear in the film, but you're just going to have to wait," says Jodie.

However, she is quick to respond to Stone's view that Jackie was involved in a romantic affair.

"You mean my bodyguard? The one who was supposed to be my lover?" Jodie snickered to a reporter in her best Jackie imitation.

"To even suggest Jacqueline was having an affair while she was married to Jack is the most horrendous lie," charges Jackie's stepbrother, Jamie Auchincloss.

"Have these film people absolutely no shame? Hasn't she been through enough?"


Author C. David Heymann, who wrote the 1990 best-selling biography, A Woman Named Jackie, recoiled at the thought that a filmmaker would dare to suggest that Jackie, now 60 and a grandmother, had affairs while married to the President.

"It's absolutely, categorically untrue," Heymann told STAR. "That's a myth so off the wall it's ludicrous."

Christina Hare, Stone's assistant on the JFK project, refused to discuss how Jackie will be portrayed in the film, which is scheduled to be released this fall.

"Oliver has many things up his sleeve," Hare said.

"He's very secretive and sensitive about this project. I just can't answer any questions."
